The Land

The land has been a constant throughout our 30 years and is an essential part of our programs and who we are. From the preschool program, 1991-2011, where children listened to animal heartbeats with stethoscopes, to today's

Environmental Education program where fifth graders from local Catholic schools spend a week three times a year, the land is an integral part of the Center and is incorporated into many programs and events. In addition, individuals, couples, and families often visit the land to walk the trails, the Rosary Walk, and the Stations of the Cross.

"I have gone out to the Center on several occasions over the last two years, primarily to walk the trails looking for the various birds that either nest for the season or are merely passing through on their migrations. Even on those

Counseling

Sister Colleen Ann Nagle, FSE began counseling services in 1985 when she met clients in the rooms above Franciscan Heritage Foods in Ada, MI. She then brought those services to the Center when it opened. Over the years, our counselors have also led parent and teacher education classes and assisted in crisis management. Today, our staff of nine clinical therapists work in eight Catholic schools and provide services for private clients throughout West Michigan.

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Music Therapy

The music therapy program has evolved from a small music lesson studio in Ada to two facilities in Lowell and Grand Rapids. What began as a program for children with autism has now become a fully staffed program with six board certified therapists who provide music therapy in schools, eldercare, hospitals, hospice care and group homes across eight surrounding counties. As well as our community partnerships, we provide therapy on an individual basis for children and adults with varying needs.

Grand Rapids Campus


